Call for Mentors for the 2019 Cohort of Payne Fellows:

The Donald M. Payne Fellowship Program is now accepting expressions of interest for its mentoring program. The Payne Fellowship is a U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) program, administered by Howard University, which seeks to attract and prepare outstanding individuals for careers as USAID Foreign Service Officers (FSO). Payne Fellows receive support for graduate school, professional development opportunities, and gain employment with the Agency as a Foreign Service Officer.

The Mentoring Program is the result of strong collaboration between the USAID Alumni Association (UAA), Agency leaders who have championed the Payne Fellowship Program, and Howard University staff. We need the collective wisdom of retired FSOs to contribute with current staff to help develop the next generation of FSOs.

Potential mentors should know they will have access to mentor training and resources, should they want it. New and continuing mentors for Payne Fellows are invited to join UAA's annual mentor orientation program, have access to UAA mentoring resources, and have the support of ongoing mentors to help support their own mentoring efforts.

Responsibilities of Mentors:

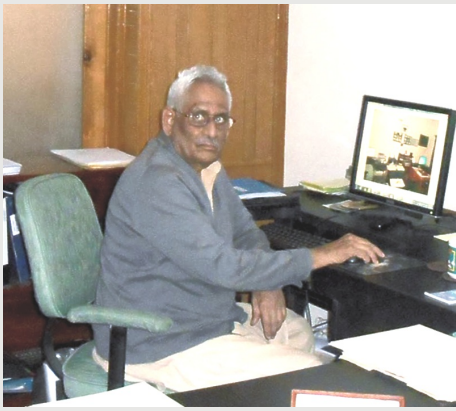
- Contribute to the development of the next generation of FSOs.
- Clarify expectations and boundaries of the mentor-mentee relationship.
- Commit to spending time with the mentee to develop the relationship.
- Encourage the mentee through constructive feedback.
- Create an environment that allows the mentee to ask questions without being intimidated.
- Offer advice by sharing life experiences.
- Be prompt for meetings and scheduled calls and use the time efficiently.

The 2019 Payne Mentors selection will begin in early April and will be matched with their mentees before their D.C. summer internship starts. The time commitment for the mentor is minimal, but can make a big difference for a new USAID FSO. Alumni Profile: Shahabuddin Khan



Shahabuddin Khan worked for USAID as a Foreign Service National in Pakistan from 1982-1993 as a Project Development Officer, backstopping the education and area management portfolios. While he was employed at USAID, he also established an educational foundation to support students from the Meo group in Pakistan, a disadvantaged group who migrated from India in 1947 at the time of partition. Mr. Khan, himself, is from this group.

Having faced difficulties in getting his own education, he wanted to help others pursue theirs. Thus, in 1991, he established a foundation in his grandfather's name, The Munshi Qamaruddin Khan Foundation for Education and Research, where he planned to devote his time after retirement to

advance his and his grandfather's dream to assist others to realize their potential. During its more than 25 year existence, the foundation has provided over two million Pakistani rupees in financial assistance to seven scholars for graduate and undergraduate degrees.

One of the objectives of the foundation was also to build a strong institution to serve as an example for other Meo associations in Pakistan and to do some constructive work in the community. The foundation is now working with these associations to improve their performance so they can help the broader community.

Shahabuddin's interest in education can be traced to his grandfather whose ancestors were born in Mewat, India, one of the most illiterate communities in India, having only one literate person out of the 1,000 member community in 1900. Both his grandfather and father wanted their children and those of the community at large to get education, but both died young. By the time of his father's death, his family had migrated to Pakistan. Shahabuddin had to quit school and go to work. During 20 years of private study, he was able to pass the examinations for high school, intermediate and bachelor's degrees.

When he discovered that the history of Mewat was being lost, Shahabuddin wrote a paper on its history which was published in the Journal of the Research Society of the Punjab University.

After the death of his wife, Shahabuddin moved to the States in 2001, where he has two sons and a daughter. One daughter also lives in Canada.
