"I Dream a World" is a captivating exhibition showcasing Brian Lanker's photographs of African American women who have made significant contributions. The exhibition is based on Lanker's book of the same name, which focuses on 76 remarkable women. This two-part exhibition features portraits of writers, entertainers, athletes, activists, and politicians, all of whom were interviewed by Lanker and photographed according to their preferences. Part one was exhibited from October 2022 to February 2023, while part two is the current exhibit, featuring fourteen portraits of extraordinary women. The exhibit includes well-known women such as Cecily Tyson (actress), Angela Davis (activist), Sonia Sanchez (poet), Dorothy Height (activist), and Katherine Dunham (dancer), Elizabeth Catlett (artist), and Charlayne Hunter Gault (journalist) and lesserknown such as Ellen Stewart of La Mama Theater in New York.

Since the publication of "I Dream a World: Portraits of Black Women Who Changed America" over thirty years ago, African American women have gained greater visibility and recognition nationally and globally. Lanker expressed the importance of preserving the historical lives of these women, as they played key roles in advancing America through the civil rights and women's movements.

The women featured in "I Dream a World" overcame significant adversity, and their personal challenges, inspiring journeys, and unwavering determination serve as a source of inspiration for all. In the book's foreword, Maya Angelou noted that these women's gazes acknowledge, understand, and reach beyond us, demonstrating their resilience and determination to persevere.

After the museum tour, we gathered at Jaléo by José Andres in Chinatown, where we enjoyed a fabulous lunch consisting of delicious small plates. The atmosphere was filled with engaging conversations, laughter, and joy, making it a truly great time for everyone involved.
