Note from the UAA Board

February was a short, roller-coaster of a month in the DMV. With temperatures that ranged from nearly 0 to over 80, spring threatens an early arrival with cherries, magnolias, and jonquils in bloom even as snowflakes occasionally threaten a visit!

UAA was relatively quiet this month, but UAA members were active in a variety of fora and development issues were ever-present:

Meetings and webinars on development issues (check out the Bulletin Board for additional events!): the monthly Africa Forum at GWU, including the Feb. 28th Africa's Future: Democracy and Human Rights and the March 27th Africa's Future: Trade and Investment; USAID's Webinar series, including Feb. 28th on Localization and March 13th on Chat GBT and AI at USAID; and MFAN's March 1 session on "Metrics Matter for Locally Led Development.

Colleagues in print: a letter to the editor (NYT) cautioned on the link between animal protein development and future pandemics, another (WaPo) expressed appreciation for Tim Rieser's support for USAID, and Brookings posted a new article titled "Resilience must drive USAID Programs in Afghanistan."

March events: March has brought opportunities to meet one another again at the March 5th WinterFest, hosted again by the ever-gracious Frank and Antoinette Almaguer, and the March 22nd Second Annual Retirement Ceremony co-hosted by UAA and USAID.

- NEW! SAVE THE DATE! March 22, 2023, from 9 am-10 am EST, everyone is invited to participate virtually in USAID's Annual Retirement Ceremony honoring the service of Foreign Service and Civil Service officers who retired during 2022. USAID Administrator Samantha Power is scheduled to speak, along with other HQ senior officials and two of our Alumni leaders. As the March 22 date approaches, we will send out the on-line video conference link. We encourage you to watch this Ceremony online! UAA has been instrumental in motivating the Agency to make such official recognition of career officers' service an annual event and to include all grades. Last year's Ceremony was limited to SES and SFS officers from multiple prior years and honored about 100 of our colleagues. It was well attended by over 400 viewers and helped set the stage for this year's more inclusive Ceremony.
- NEW! On Wednesday, April 19, 2023, a (hybrid) lunch session at DACOR of the UAA/DACOR Development Dialogue will feature Tim Rieser. Just retired, he spent nearly four decades as foreign policy adviser to Senator Patrick Leahy and the Appropriations Subcommittee on State and Foreign Operations. Well known to many AID staff, he was highly influential on AID policy issues and on key foreign policy issues on which Sen. Leahy focused (e.g., restoring diplomatic relations with Cuba). He will be engaged in conversation with Dottie Rayburn who has just retired from AID's Congressional Liaison staff where she focused on the Senate Appropriations Committee. Workshop for UAA Mentors in Cohort 12

On January 31st, 2023, the UAA-USAID Mentoring Program hosted a workshop for the USAID Alumni Association (UAA) mentors participating in the 2023 Cohort 12 class. Thirty mentors attended the successful training led by UAA'S Denise Rollins, Sharon Pauling, Terry Brown, Corey Thompson from USAID's

Human Capital and Talent Management (HCTM) Office, and workshop facilitator Neil Levine.



The workshop featured Agency leaders – Counselor Clinton White; Senior Development Advisor at the Foreign Service Institute Sheryl Stumbras; and staff from the Senior Leadership Group, Lit Tazewell and Sarah Wine; Africa Bureau, Angela Williams-Bostic; and Global Health, Natalia Machuca. The Agency leaders provided updates on Agency priorities, workforce development, and challenges.

RoseMarie Depp and Sheryl Stumbras shared their experiences with their nine-year mentor-mentee relationship. USAID staff Joshua Kaufman, Sarah Rose, and Clifton Kennon, Jr. provided updates on the Agency's new development policies, localization strategy, and Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility efforts. These presentations were followed by hands-on training to prepare this year's mentors to engage with their mentees, current Foreign Service Officers posted overseas.

UAA gives "TED Talk" to Newly Elected FSN Advocacy Council

For the first time since the August 2021 US military evacuation of 150 USAID FSNs plus their immediate family members from Afghanistan, UAA has been able to pick up again to continue our partnership with the Agency's FSN Unit at HQ to provide a series of TED Talks for the new FSN Advocacy Council. The 11 members of the Council were elected in the Fall of 2022 by their FSN peers from their respective geographic regions around the world, representing over 4,000 FSNs. This Council for the next 2 years includes FSNs from Bangladesh, Pakistan, Serbia, Armenia, Honduras, Colombia, Jordan, Egypt, Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria, and Zambia.

Both the Council and HQ's FSN Unit asked us to focus for the first session on "Leadership," which became our TED Talk topic and Q&A together with a majority of the Council for over an hour during the early morning EST of

February 22nd. The FSNs and the HQ FSN Unit agreed that they would like UAA to continue with future TED talks on topics of interest to the Council. Chris Milligan, Tom Staal, Mary Alice Kleinjan, and Jim Bever spoke on behalf of UAA. Future sessions will also include Bambi Arellano and Terry Myers. Stay tuned!

USAID's Office of Population and Reproductive Health Reunion



The former Directors of USAID's Office of Population and Reproductive Health organized a reunion that was held on November 4-5, 2022. More than 150 current and former staff attended the event. The first-of-its-kind reunion included a day-long review of

the program's achievements, challenges, and impacts. It also included an overview of its current program and future directions, featuring a set of presentations and a rich discussion among participants. The Center for Global Development provided the venue for the reunion and documented its proceedings, culminating in a summary note on the event, written by Julia Kaufman and Morgan Pincombe.

Alumni Profile: Frank Young

As Frank Young recounts in his book, "47 Aerogrammes: A Passage Through India," living in South India in the late 1960s inflamed his passion to work in development. But the journey to that profession took many detours including living in Taiwan, serving as legislative aide to a California congressman, and an internship with the Culinary Institute of America. He joined USAID in 1976 and was told he would go to Yemen, in Africa. That suggested it would be an



interesting career. It didn't involve Yemen, but included the Philippines, India, Bangladesh and, finally, Ghana as Mission Director.

During his overseas tours, Frank found opportunities to pursue his second love, theater. He joined the Manila Theater Guild and starred in its production of "Grease," performed in "Bye Bye Birdie" in New Delhi, and in Ghana played the "dame" in British pantomime productions at Christmas with the British Players.



Retirement proved elusive. After a twoyear stint teaching at the National War College and a year as DAA/Africa, he left USAID in 2005. He spent four years in the private sector but returned to USAID as Acting AA/Asia in early 2010, joining George Laudato (AA/ME) and Janet Ballantyne (AA/LAC) as the old-timer's triumvirate amidst the new leadership at USAID. After stints with the Development Leadership Initiative program, Foreign Service Institute, and Inspector General's office at State, Frank left government in 2014.

In 2016, he left Bethesda with his wife, Pat, a retired Canadian FSO, for Sarasota, Florida. It was a difficult choice, because they left behind Frank's daughter, her wife and their newborn grandson. In a busy retirement, he joined the board of the Sarasota World Affairs Council for two years, worked as poll watcher for three elections, mentored deputy mission

directors for UAA, and then joined the Board of the Foreign Service Retirees Association of Florida, serving as its Chair in 2022. He still serves on that Board and enjoys leading Great Decisions seminars and talking on foreign policy topics at Osher Institute's Ringling College. While not in Sarasota enjoying the city's arts scene, he and Pat spend summers in Canada where their son lives, visiting their grandson and daughter in Ellicott City, MD on the way. He and Pat still travel, journeying to new parts of the world on a quest to join the "century club" (100 countries). They would welcome hearing from friends and colleagues at fyoungbethesda@aol.com.
