### Note from the UAA Board

After three years of meeting almost exclusively by Zoom, in-person events exploded in April with the cherry blossoms! Starting with WinterFest and then the Retirement Ceremony in March, UAA volunteers met with new retirees at the NFATC Job Search Program and with over 58 colleagues at DACOR, with more attending virtually, to join the UAA-DACOR Development Dialogue between Dottie Rayburn and Tim Reiser. The conversation was substantive and insightful, and it was delightful to meet in-person again – see the photos below!

We have joined the campaign to support the Foreign Service Commemorative Coin Act to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Foreign Service. April also saw the launch of the 2023 Strategic Framework and Implementation Plan review to ensure that the annual report and budget can be presented later this year. Finally, a new Nominating Committee (Margaret Neuse, chair, Carol Dabbs, and Miles Toder) was formed to identify candidates to fill this year's Board vacancies –the June newsletter will include details on the calendar and the nominating process.

May and early June promise to be even more active!

- On May 2, UAA members will support a dialogue with USAID Deputy Administrator Coleman and Florida International University about how UAA might help familiarize students with global development issues and thereby help USAID attract a more diverse, talented, and committed workforce. Then May 11 will see the Board's next quarterly meeting with USAID Deputy Administrator Adams-Allen to discuss implementation of our joint programs.

### **NEW! SAVE THE DATE! On Friday, May 19 in Jacksonville, Florida**

UAA is hosting a regional event in conjunction with the Foreign Service Retiree Association (FSRA) and the World Affairs Council (WAC). Like the first regional event we held in Sarasota in January, also in conjunction with FSRA, we want to use this opportunity to reach UAA members residing in the northern part of the state with an aim of building UAA's first regional chapter in Florida. There will be an FSRA luncheon on the 19th with a guest speaker followed by a UAA panel discussion and social event. The guest speaker is Moussa Traore of USAID's Center for Economics and Market Development who will discuss the importance of International Trade to the U.S. economy. The meeting will be hybrid but we are hoping to have a good turnout of alumni who will be able to participate in person.

### **NEW! On Wednesday, May 24, Francisco Sagasti, former President of Peru (November 2020-July 2021) will speak at a Development Dialogue lunch at DACOR (12 noon–2:00).**

He will reflect on the exercise of political power and authority at crisis times – “Peru – A President's Experience ...and What Lies Ahead.” Sagasti has had a long and distinguished career in Peru and around the world, including at the World Bank and the United Nations. ### **Tim Rieser in conversation with Dottie Rayburn**

On Wednesday, April 19, at this UAA/DACOR Development Dialogue, a packed DACOR House was treated to very thoughtful and perceptive comments from Tim Rieser, responding to questions from Dottie Rayburn, recently retired from USAID after decades on the Congressional Liaison Staff. Tim spoke candidly about his experience working for Senator Leahy (VT) for 37 years on key foreign affairs issues, including detailed attention to USAID development programs. ### **Alumni Profile: William Penoyar**



Bill Penoyar's international career began with the Arabian American Oil Company when he moved with his family to Saudi Arabia in 1983. There he gained experience in contract negotiations and the international travel bug that endured after he returned to the United States. After working as a contract negotiator with the Navy in 1987, Bill accepted a job in the USAID contracting office in

1992. He obtained a project development job in the European and Newly Independent States (ENI) Bureau until 1999 when he was offered a Limited Appointment Foreign Service Position with the West Newly Independent States Mission in Kyiv, Ukraine.

While working at ENI, Bill started on a path of helping people he met along the way in his international service. The many immigrants he has assisted during his work with USAID has continued during retirement and provided great personal fulfillment.

He and his wife, Sandi, hosted a Russian woman visiting the U.S. on a USAID work internship in 1997. When the company for which she interned had her return to the U.S. on a long-term visa, she needed a place to live, so Bill and Sandi offered her a room in their home. Eventually, she obtained her green card, and later, her U.S. citizenship. She was the Penoyars' first opportunity to support an immigrant. Twenty-five years later, Bill and Sandi still count Elena as one of their good friends.

Bill, Sandi, and their two daughters have continued to develop friendships and have sponsored an extended refugee Iraqi family whom Bill met while working as a USAID Provincial Reconstruction Team representative. The two families included five children in 2012. They are all U. S. citizens now and have in some ways become part of the Penoyar family.

Since then, Bill has also helped a Ukrainian woman who is presently in the process of applying for her permanent Green Card status and eventual citizenship.

Although he retired from USAID in 2011 and U.S. Personal Service Contract work in 2016, Bill continued to offer assistance to folks who are talented and have taken substantial risks to immigrate to the U.S on Refugee or Special Immigrant Visa status. Since the evacuation of Afghan refugees in 2021, Bill has helped a UAA identified refugee, located in Modesto, California, with his resume and job search which helped him obtain a job. Through the Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area. Bill helped a young Afghan woman obtain a job in the Arlington, VA area. He is presently assisting a Ukrainian, and other Afghans with their resumes and job search.

Bill says, "This ongoing volunteer assistance continues to be a rewarding avocation for me in addition to the many other pleasures of being retired." His experiences have also contributed to his writing and publishing two books available on Amazon.com: *On the Road with a Foreign Service Officer*, 2014 and *Surviving Dreamland – Escape from Terror*, 2017
