UAA/USAID Mentoring Program



Cohort 13 of the <u>UAA/USAID Mentoring Program</u> successfully conducted two key events. On Wednesday, January 17th, a comprehensive virtual training workshop was organized for mentors, attended by sixty-six participants. The following day, a focused 90-minute webinar catered to forty mentees. This year, the program proudly boasts 70 mentor-mentee pairs, nearly doubling its size over last year. The program collaborates with the Bureaus for Africa, Asia, and Global Health and engages the Senior Leadership Group (SLG). Neil Levine, a USAID retiree and UAA member, was lauded for his exceptional facilitation of the mentor training.

Deputy Administrator Paloma Adams-Allen opened the mentor training, sharing insights on various critical topics such as Leadership Development, Global Development Partnerships, and challenges like global conflicts, localization, FSN empowerment, and procurement reform, to name a few. The event also featured SDAA Kathryn Stevens from the Office of Human Capital and Talent Management, Joshua Kaufman from the Bureau for Planning, Learning, and Resource Management, and Anya Glenn, Director of the Office of Workforce Planning. Bureau and SLG Coordinators provided specific perspectives on major challenges facing each bureau or senior leaders. For the first time, AFSA was represented by Randy Chester and Sue Bremner.

The training's afternoon sessions were dedicated to practical aspects of mentoring, including real conversations and simulated practices. We could not have organized or implemented Cohort 13 without the support and partnership of Corey Thompson, Training Specialist, Center for Professional Development at HCTM. The USAID presenters were recorded, and the video is available from Denise Rollins or Sharon Pauling, Co-Chairs of the UAA Mentoring Committee at denise.rollins52@gmail.com or sharonpauling1@gmail.com. The Mentee Webinar centered on orienting mentees to the mentoring program and provided insights on maximizing their mentorship. Mentees were encouraged to be prepared, identify short-term and long-term goals for the mentoring, and use their mentor as a sounding board to provide different perspectives. Highlights from the mentor training were shared with the mentees.

Alumni Profile: David Adams

David R. Adams was born in Washington, D.C., into a family with deep roots in the nation's capital and Virginia. Nine months after his birth, David began his foreign service "training" in Greece, where his father had taken up his first government posting. During the next 20 years of his father's career abroad, David became deeply impressed by the poverty in developing countries where they lived: Taiwan in the 1960s and Laos in the 1970s. These experiences led



David to a career with USAID after he graduated from William & Mary and grad school at George Washington University.

Over the next 30 years, David served in a variety of USAID assignments in Washington and abroad, first in the Civil Service and then the Foreign Service. His overseas assignments culminated in 2004 after three years as Haiti Mission Director. David's career was punctuated by assignments off the beaten path. These included stints with the United Nations in Bangladesh as a congressional (Foreign Operations) staffer, and as a senior resources and policy adviser in Secretary Warren Christopher's office. USAID Administrator Brian Atwood called David "one of the agency's premier troubleshooters" (others would say,

troublemaker!), for example, because of David's role as Kosovo Task Force Coordinator during that Balkans crisis.



The day after his 2006 retirement from USAID, David and his wife Myra caught the auto train down to Florida for a new life. David's "second career" began as the first Vice President for (overseas) Missions with a new interdenominational Christian relief and development agency, Cross International/Cross Catholic Outreach (CI/CCO). Over the following 16 years, he greatly expanded CI/CCO's staffing, systems and footprint in Latin America, Africa and Asia. He also organized and led foundation and U.S. Government grant acquisition that resulted in greatly increased revenue. In January 2023, David transitioned into his current role as V.P. Emeritus for Cross Catholic Outreach, and a part-time consultant for association partnerships. He is also active in his Catholic Church, as a

member of the Parish Council and as a Scripture reader at Mass. David also serves on the board of the local chapter of Legatus, a national Catholic business leaders association. He and Myra continue to live in Ft. Lauderdale, promoting various causes, including a ministry that fosters education on the Shroud of Turin. They travel abroad and domestically, most notably to northern Virginia to visit David's two sons and four grandchildren.
