Note from the UAA Board

One year ago, as our 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) concluded, the Board's concerns included increasing the number of UAA members, expanding our ever-popular Mentoring Program with USAID, improving outreach to former USAID FSNs, building UAA regional programs outside the Washington metro area, and quickly engaging with the new Administration. We had a number of group mentoring and coaching calls with Mission Directors and Deputy Directors, providing ideas and insights on navigating the transition from one Administration to another. No one predicted the total dismantling of the Agency, and the subsequent chaos, disruption and dismay that followed.

The UAA joined other groups and individuals that pushed for Congressional action, at the same time increasing our outreach beyond the DC metro area to the Northeast, North Carolina, Florida, and California. We organized a network and joined with other organizations to set up welcome home and meet-and-greet events for our colleagues returning from overseas. We established an emergency fund to provide short term financial support for recently dismissed USAID staff. We have joined other organizations and individuals to discuss assistance strategy, structures and skills needed to implement programs. UAA's knowledge management program team has focused on ensuring that the knowledge, skills, and experiences of USAID FSNs in particular are captured before these subject matter experts move on to new employment opportunities or to a new field entirely.

UAA's 2025 AGM is intended to provoke a deep discussion on the future, considering USAID no longer exists. If you are planning on attending the AGM and have not yet registered, please do so. Our venue at the Center

These are just a few of the many notes of thanks the UAA has received from former USAID staff who have received \$2000 grants from UAA's fund. While the fund has received over \$260,000 in donations and has approved over 100 grants, we are nearing the end of our current level of resources. The amount we need to cover the number of outstanding eligible applications exceeds the fund's balance, and we continue to receive new applications given that many RIFs occurred

September 2. We have set a goal of \$500,000 so that we can meet the overall demand that we expect.

USAID Knowledge Rescue

USAID's legacy includes research, data, photos, human interest stories, and collective expertise accumulated over the last six decades of the Agency's work. Recognizing the urgent need to locate, preserve, and share these resources, the UAA has teamed up with the [Aid Transition Alliance \(AtA\)](#) to collect materials to create a free, searchable database. So far, we've collected 145,393 resources and received individual interview requests from 140 former staff. [Share materials you want included in the database](#). Our individual interviews will start in earnest in October, with up to 60 interviews per month. We also are testing an approach to carrying out group discussions on specific approaches, methodologies and tools; the first two (Nature, and Power/Natural Resource Management; and Political Economy Analysis/Thinking Politically) will be piloted later in October, and others will be rolled out later in the year.

Bibliography of USAID Authors

Several intriguing books have been added to the Bibliography of USAID Authors.

Cheema JK. The Black Attache. 2023. Caumet Editions, ISBN-10.1960250809. This is a blend of history, travelogue and reflections in the form of short vignettes from Cheema's life. Cheema shares her memories from the events she experienced during the India-Pakistan partition to her growing up in India, nearly dying on the last train out from Lahore, Pakistan. It covers her very lengthy and unusual career with USAID. After 25 years overseas, including several consultancies, she retired to Madison, Wisconsin. The Black Attache is the first of her two books sharing her life. It is a snapshot of a young girl born in India, aspiring to make a difference in the world and doing so as a foreign service officer with USAID.

Bloeser, Bee. Vaccines and Bayonets: A Historical Memoir. 2021.

Development Dialogues

DACOR: Liz Schrayer on "How America Wins in the World"



On Tuesday, September 30, 2025, USGLC President and CEO Liz Schrayer spoke to a sell-out luncheon audience at DACOR. She backed up her talk's ambitious title, "How America Wins in the World," by citing a number of recent important USGLC accomplishments in addressing today's challenges and by setting out a program of ideas for further building support for development cooperation throughout the nation and in Congress. At Ms. Schrayer's request the program was not recorded.

Dr. Homi Kharas on "From Aid-Driven to Investment-Driven Models of Sustainable Development"

The Development Issues Committee hosted a discussion on September 9 with Dr. Homi Kharas, Senior Fellow with the Center for Sustainable Development at the Brookings Institution. Dr. Kharas presented his co-



authored paper, "From Aid-Driven to Investment-Driven Models of Sustainable Development." The paper argues that development finance should be based on estimates of financial needs for environmentally sustainable development in Emerging and Developing Economies in an inter-connected world and that both public and private resources should be mobilized to address these needs. Identified needs include health and education, physical infrastructure, resilience, biodiversity conservation and sustainable agriculture.

Profile: Dottie Rayburn



Dottie's initial interest in international development was sparked by the commencement speech by the first Peace Corps Director, Sargent Shriver, at her high school graduation. After college she embraced a career immersed in international development with the Peace Corps, U.S. Congress, State Department, and USAID. Following two+ years as a PCV teacher in the Philippines, she moved to Capitol Hill for five years as Congressional staff. Back at Peace Corps HQ (1975-1981) Dottie became Chief of Operations for the North Africa, Middle East, Asia, and Pacific Regions. She served five years at the then U.S. Information Agency and earned a law degree at American University. In 1987, Dottie found her professional home in USAID's Office of

Legislative Affairs, where she represented USAID on the Hill until February 2025, except for an eight-year stint at State during the Obama Administration and a break in 2014.

At USAID, Dottie specialized in the budget and appropriations process and developed close relationships with Members and staff on both sides of the aisle, enabling her to help secure Congressional support for many key initiatives. Illustratively, she pursued maintaining bipartisan Congressional support for the sensitive undertaking of getting humanitarian supplies into Afghanistan to support the families of Afghans fighting the Soviet invasion. Dottie worked with Congress on passage of legislation to build the economies of Eastern European countries following the fall of the Berlin Wall. Her international travel with Members and staff often helped gain Congressional support. In the wake of the devastating 2004 Tsunami that swept the Indian Ocean, USAID led on both response and reconstruction efforts, but the price tag was high. After seeing first-hand how USAID was leading the response effort on the ground,

Congress passed a supplemental which helped to rebuild Aceh in Indonesia, fostering an atmosphere of trust that led to a peace process ending years of civil conflict engulfing that region.

Since fully retiring in February 2025, Dottie remains an active advocate on the Hill for USAID and its staff. In September, she organized a panel on Capitol Hill of ten recently returned Mission Directors to discuss the devastating impact of the withdrawal of USAID. Dottie divides her time between Washington and Bethany, DE. Her various activities include gardening, birdwatching, walking, reading, as well as spending time with family, and traveling. Dottie also meets local food and housing needs in the D.C. area - through her volunteer engagement with Martha's Table, Central Union Mission, and Habitat for Humanity.
