UAA Annual General Meeting



Jim Kunder, Keynote Speaker

Thanks to everyone who participated in the 2025 UAA Annual General Meeting (AGM), either in-person or virtually. Your active participation enriched the meeting and brought in many new ideas.

Many thanks to Jim Kunder whose thoughtful keynote address was an inspiring way to launch the meeting with its challenge to envision what comes after USAID in the arena of development collaboration. The panel continued with a stimulating discussion of the future of international development collaboration. The panel was moderated by Masood Ahmed of CGD with panelists Ndidi Nwuneli from the One Campaign, Charles Kenny of CGD and Andrew Herscowitz from the Rockefeller Foundation.

UAA Board Co-Chair Roberta Mahoney briefed the members on UAA's work during the past year, focusing on the period after the destruction of USAID. The briefing included a description by Board member Tony Pryor of ongoing activities related to knowledge preservation. USAID's legacy includes research, data, photos, human interest stories, and collective expertise accumulated over the last six decades of the Agency's work.

UAA Staff Financial Support Fund Update

We greatly appreciate everyone who has donated to the USAID Staff Financial Support Fund to assist former staff (and families) whose jobs were unceremoniously terminated through the dissolution of USAID. The fund has raised over \$340,000 and 150 grants have been approved with another 20 in process. Remaining are about 60 eligible applications which we would like to approve over the next several weeks.

Our fundraising now is focused on being able to approve those remaining 60 applications (and any new ones received), and we will continue to fundraise as long as possible. We have established a waiting list and will process the applications as we have funds available. It is likely that we will close the application process within a month or so. Session on Career Transition

The USAID Alumni Association (UAA) hosted a virtual session titled "Successful Career Transition: Experiences that Worked" on Thursday,

October 18, 2025. Nearly 50 UAA members attended the discussion.

The session featured a panel of four former USAID employees who were part of this year's reduction in force and have since successfully transitioned into new positions. They shared their personal experiences, strategies, and lessons learned in navigating the job market and building new careers.

The panelists encouraged participants to look beyond traditional career paths and explore opportunities in organizations outside their usual professional sphere. They emphasized leveraging transferable skills—particularly in management and leadership—and remaining flexible in considering roles that may not have been on their original preference list.

A central takeaway at this session was the importance of staying positive, open-minded and confident, regardless of age or prior seniority.

One of the most engaging parts of the discussion focused on the role of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in today's job search. All panelists reported using AI tools to review and tailor their résumés to job descriptions—including Claude AI and other online platforms—to improve their application's alignment with employer screening systems. Many companies today have closed HR departments and substituted AI Applicant Tracking Systems (ATS) to recruit, interview, hire, and manage the recruitment workflow, all without a human interface. This process, though often frustrating for applicants, is important for applicants to understand.

The UAA will continue to collect and publicize information about books written by USAID FSOs, FSNs, and family members adding to our on-line collection of 353.

Five new ones include Daniel Miller's *Fifty Years Among Nomads and Cowboys: Roamin' the Range and Mountains*, his 16th entry in our collection. It compiles the 150 best photos and text from his travels in Nepal, Bhutan, Tibet, Mongolia and the American West. Recently RIF'd after 15 years as an FSO, Stephen Berlinguette has written the intriguing *Operation Lam Quen: Motorcycling Vietnam One Landing at a Time*. It's a journey through Vietnam's hidden war history - told one back-road, battlefield and roadside beer at a time. A recent retiree, Danielle Reiff has edited a much-needed book *Overcoming Information Chaos: A Guide to Cultivating Peaceful Communities in the Digital Age*. Danielle is a peacebuilder, writer and FSO for 20 years specializing in supporting democratic transitions and peacebuilding processes. She founded the nonpartisan Peacebuilders Initiative.

Two books of fiction have also come to our attention. *What We Were Making* by Peter Cloutier explores the challenges to a British diplomat assigned to Jakarta and an American expat teacher who learn of a plot to undermine foreign aid provided after a natural disaster - "a masterful blend of two contrasting worlds, political and natural". Peter is a retired FSO of 21 years of service. 103-year-old Irving Tragen has published the 2nd book of a trilogy dealing with El Salvador in the mid-20th century: *Esperanza: Daring to Dream Beyond Borders*. During his long career at USAID, State, OAS and executive director of the Inter-American Drug Abuse Control Commission, Irv, who was much admired by my old LAC DAA boss, Marshall (Buster) Brown, worked in all 33 Latin American and Caribbean countries.

Profile: Anne Aarnes and David Sprague

Anne Aarnes and David Sprague met in a meeting in 1978 in USAID/Washington, where they both had GS jobs. It must have been a good meeting because they married two years later.

Anne had joined USAID in 1969, focusing on population/family planning programs. David, joining the agency in 1972, worked in the Education



Office of USAID's central technical bureau. Neither of them had planned to spend their careers in USAID, but each of them, within their first few years of joining the agency, found USAID's work intensely compelling.

In 1988, Anne and David both converted to USAID's Foreign Service and went overseas with their two young children, Michael and Leslie, spending the next 21 years in six postings: Pakistan, Ukraine, Bangladesh, Egypt, Jordan, and back to Pakistan. David retired from USAID in 2000, but he continued to accompany Anne and worked as an education contractor for the World Bank and USAID in Egypt,

Jordan, and their final tour in Pakistan. Anne was Mission Director in Jordan and Pakistan.

All their postings were challenging and fascinating, and the first two laid the foundation for their time overseas. In Pakistan, the tour began in 1988 with a tragic plane crash that killed the U.S. Ambassador and the Pakistani President. The Mission and the Pakistan government mounted successful programs in primary education and family planning—important areas for Pakistan's development. However, by the end of their tour, USAID was phasing out of Pakistan as required by the Pressler Amendment. In Ukraine in 1994-1997, David and Anne were among the first on the ground to help establish a major USAID Mission from scratch in this impoverished country, isolated from the west for 70 years. Eventually, the Mission flourished: developed programs and gained staff, work space, and even heat and hot water in personal residences. These first two postings reinforced basic ground rules: stay calm, be flexible, persevere, and expect the unexpected.

Returning to USAID/Washington in 2009, Anne served as a faculty member at the National War College and as Senior DAA in three USAID regional bureaus. Meanwhile, David worked for the Academy for Educational Development and the URC (University Research Co.) on USAID-funded education projects. He also taught graduate courses on international education at Georgetown University and Johns Hopkins School for Advanced International Studies. Anne retired in 2015 with the grade of Career Minister and settled down with David for good in Washington, DC.

In retirement, Anne and David have volunteered in their neighborhood association to help senior citizens "age in place." They have remained engaged in international development by joining and serving on the

boards of NGOs concerned with Middle East refugee assistance, archaeological and other studies related to Jordan, and American diplomacy and foreign affairs issues. They have both been involved in the work of the USAID Alumni Association over the past 10-15 years. Their involvement will likely increase given UAA's efforts to help those who have lost their jobs in 2025 and to preserve USAID's deep knowledge of development.

The travel bug has not disappeared as Anne and David continue to travel to places they did not have time to visit during their USAID careers: Europe, East Asia, and the United States.

Every year they spend the summer in Vermont. A major activity is co-hosting the "Development Wallahs Picnic," which is an annual gathering, mostly USAID retirees, who have settled in Vermont and nearby states. One of their greatest joys is seeing USAID friends and colleagues, so they were particularly happy this summer to have some of USAID's newest former employees join the group.
