Note from the UAA Board

The USAID Alumni Association brings together those who share a deep commitment to public service and the mission that defined our careers.

As Congress designates the first Friday in May to honor members of the U.S. Foreign Service, this moment offers an opportunity to reflect on that service—and to recognize the contributions made in support of both global partners and the American people.

The USAID Memorial Wall honoring those who lost their lives in service has been installed at the State Department's D Street entrance. A rededication ceremony is expected to take place on May 4, during which additional names will be formally recognized. This tribute ensures that the sacrifices of our colleagues are permanently acknowledged. We have requested that the USAID Alumni Association be represented at this important event, alongside former colleagues and family members of the fallen, so that we can join in paying our respects. We are awaiting confirmation.

UAA has also engaged the State Department to express our concerns regarding recent restrictions that affect FSNs. These measures have serious implications for former local staff, many of whom worked alongside U.S. personnel under difficult and often dangerous conditions. The UAA has strongly urged that clear exceptions be included in all relevant immigration and travel policies to protect these individuals.

We are particularly concerned by recent reporting that approximately 1,100 Afghans—including interpreters, military partners, civil society leaders, and families of our local staff—may be redirected to third countries following the suspension of U.S. resettlement pathways. These individuals placed their trust in the United States, often at great personal risk. We will continue to advocate on their behalf.

Finally, we want to underscore the importance of outreach. We hope those who participated in recent training sessions found them valuable, and we encourage you to share your experiences and efforts. Outreach materials are now available on the UAA website, and we look forward to building greater engagement across our community.

We also hope to see many of you at the Spring Reception on May 28—a chance to reconnect, reflect, and reaffirm the shared values that unite us.

UAA-DACOR Career Panel: Transition to Teaching

On Tuesday, April 21, UAA partnered with DACOR Bacon House to host a Career Panel on Transition to Teaching. The panel featured five representatives, including officials from Fairfax County Public Schools — the largest school system in Virginia and the ninth largest in the nation, with 160,000 students and 13,000 teachers — as well as representatives from the colleges of education at George Mason University and the University of the District of Columbia. The hybrid event drew 12 in-person attendees at DACOR and 45 virtual participants.



The panelists discussed the requirements for becoming a teacher and the various ways to obtain a teaching certificate while working in the classroom. Fairfax County Public Schools hires about 1,500 teachers each year, and the district is eager to recruit candidates with international experience. Fairfax students speak nearly 200 languages and come from many countries, making international experience an asset for understanding student needs.

UAA/DACOR Development Dialogue, Lunch at DACOR (and virtual), BRIAN ATWOOD, "State and AID - Building Back Better," May 12

Tuesday, May 12, 2026 : 11:45 - 2:00 pm. The last fifteen months have been very depressing, to say the least, for those of us interested in development cooperation and the role of USAID in that effort. While dwelling on the past is not fruitful, we can learn from experience, and we must urge decision-makers now and in the next few years to draw on people with special knowledge and skills. Development Issues Discussion with Alex Carnes on FY 2027 Appropriations, May 19

Please join us on May 19 from 11:00 AM to 12:30 PM for a Development Issues Discussion (virtual) with Alex Carnes, Clerk/Staff Director, of the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on the Department of State and Foreign Operations (SACFO). Alex represents one of what are often called “the four corners of appropriations” — i.e. the four committees responsible for drafting and shepherding through the Congress the annual appropriations bill which funds the State Department and other foreign affairs agencies, as well as exercising oversight of all the programs and activities implemented by those agencies. With the Senate currently in Majority Republican control, SACFO is chaired by Senator Lindsey Graham (R-SC), with the Vice Chairman, or Ranking Member, being Senator Brian Schatz (D-HI) for whom Alex works.

In his discussion with us, Alex can provide insights into Congressional priorities for foreign affairs and foreign assistance programs, as represented in the Fiscal Year 2026 foreign operations funding bill, as well as the outlook in Congress for the President’s foreign affairs budget request for FY 2027. Alex has more than 15 years of experience in the foreign affairs arena, including serving as Senior Advisor to the Deputy Secretary for Management and Resources at the State Department during the Biden Administration. He is a distinguished graduate of the Naval War College, and travels widely to oversee foreign affairs activities. [Click here](#) to register.

Sarah Rose is the Director of Policy at The Share Trust, an organization that--through research, tools, capacity strengthening, and advocacy--helps strengthen the environment for locally led development and humanitarian response and community-driven collective action. She previously served as the Senior Advisor for Localization at USAID, where she coordinated an agency-wide reform effort to advance locally led development and humanitarian assistance. Prior to her role at USAID, Sarah was a policy fellow at the Center for Global Development, where her research focused on aid effectiveness and US development policy. Sarah's previous experience also includes working as a monitoring and evaluation specialist in the health office of the USAID Mission in Mozambique and coordinating country selection and eligibility in the department of policy and evaluation at the Millennium Challenge Corporation.

Profile: Alexious M. Butler

Alexious M. Butler began her international career working on democracy and governance programs with the National Endowment for Democracy and the National Democratic Institute. She joined USAID via the Africa Bureau on the Conflict, Peacebuilding, and Governance team before moving to Afghanistan as an Elections and Political Process Advisor.



Alexious' next assignment took her to Iraq, first as a member of an embedded Provincial Reconstruction Team in the Al-Mada'in District of eastern Baghdad Province, and then in the Democracy and Governance Office in Baghdad. There she managed elections support programs, including the Iraq out-of-country voting initiative implemented by IFES, which expanded participation for Iraqis abroad during a critical period.

Alexious went on to serve as Director of the Democracy and Governance Office in Bangladesh, where she oversaw the first ever South Asia Women Members of Parliament Conference, which brought together female MPs from seven countries to identify common concerns. She served in the same role in South Sudan, arriving shortly before the outbreak of the 2013 civil war. Ultimately, she and her colleagues were evacuated from Juba with AFRICOM support and spent six months in Washington before returning to complete their assignments. Recognizing a significant information gap, Alexious expanded an Internews program to provide live coverage of peace talks to refugees and internally displaced persons.

She later served in Haiti initially as head of the Democracy, Human Rights, and Governance Office and subsequently as Deputy Mission Director. Despite the challenges Haiti and Haitians continue to face, the four years Alexious and her

daughter spent there made it, by far, their favorite assignment as they fell in love with the country and the people.

After attending the U.S. Army War College, she served as USAID's Development Diplomat in Residence at Morehouse College in Atlanta. There, she launched the Agency's first HBCU (Historically Black Colleges and Universities) conference and developed the Minority Serving Institutions Partnership Initiative, establishing five new partnerships that laid the groundwork for expanded Agency engagement with a broader group of academic institutions.

One of her most challenging assignments was as Senior Development Advisor at U.S. Central Command in Tampa, FL where she focused on integrating development perspectives into military planning. Alexious later became Mission Director for Guinea and Sierra Leone, where she ultimately managed the Mission's closure, while also helping many local staff transition to new employment.

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Alexious now lives in Manassas, Virginia with her fiancé, Sam Padron, and their dog, Bridget Jones. She currently serves as Professor of Practice at Georgia Tech and teaches global development to the next generation of international affairs enthusiasts. Alexious' daughter, who accompanied her on assignments in Bangladesh and Haiti and studied at the University of the Arts in London, is now in Atlanta pursuing a career in the performing arts.
