UAA Inaugural Front Line Conversation Series

On September 2, the UAA FSN Working Group hosted the first sessions of the Front Line Conversation Series. This series focuses on engaging with the USAID FSN community and serving as a vehicle for FSN voices to be heard. About 80 people took part in the sessions to discuss the future of foreign assistance.

These first two sessions took place in the morning and evening of September 2. Mary Alice Kleinjan, head of the FSN Working Group, facilitated both sessions. In each session, Chris Milligan, UAA Board Co-Chair, outlined the ongoing policy debates and multiple initiatives rethinking foreign aid, emphasizing the need for FSN voices. Dottie Rayburn, legislative expert, detailed the congressional landscape, noting bipartisan support for aid but political challenges. Noreen Sargsyan and Ani Manukyan described the impact of USAID's closure in Armenia, highlighting lost programs, gaps in civil society support, and the enduring value of local expertise and relationships.

In the morning session, following these introductory remarks, participants from India, DRC, and El Salvador shared country-specific experiences, discussing the loss of trilateral cooperation opportunities, weakened institutional relationships, and China's growing influence. The discussion stressed the importance of protecting human capital, strengthening local institutions, and moving beyond transactional approaches.

In the evening session, former FSNs from several countries, including Laos, Liberia, Cambodia, and Guatemala, shared personal experiences about job losses, challenges finding new employment, and the ongoing impact of USAID's closure in their countries. The discussion emphasized the importance of preserving institutional knowledge, protecting human capital, and ensuring FSNs have a meaningful role in shaping the future of foreign assistance. Future sessions of the Front Line Conversations will be scheduled in the coming months. If you have suggestions for topics or speakers,

The agenda this year will include a keynote session – details to be announced soon! The UAA Board will lead a discussion of UAA's draft new strategy, with time for Q&A. This session will be followed by a leisurely lunch for those attending in-person to reconnect with friends and welcome new members.

The afternoon will open with a panel of emerging Regional UAA Chapters, featuring both in-person and virtual members, who will discuss their work over the past year and share perspectives from outside the DMV on the draft UAA strategy and future directions. Development Dialogues

Congress' Role in Fostering a U.S. Foreign Assistance Program that Serves the National Interest



On Wednesday, July 29, **Virginia Congressman James Walkinshaw (D)** spoke to a full **DACOR/Bacon House UAA/DACOR lunch** (and virtual) session. He made clear the importance of Congressional oversight of the Executive Branch's execution of and accountability for U.S. foreign policy, national security, diplomacy, and foreign assistance. He strongly asserted that U.S. foreign assistance is vital for our national security, that many more experienced aid professionals need to be restored into

Profile: Lela Kerashvili

Lela Kerashvili, a Georgian development and humanitarian professional with more than 20 years of experience at



In 1988–1989, while still a student in the Soviet Union, Lela was selected to participate in the first student cultural exchange programs between the Consortium of Colleges in the United States and the Soviet Union. She spent a year

at Amherst College. For a young student coming from the Soviet Union, the experience was extraordinary and she often describes it as almost like going to Mars.

Lela entered the development and humanitarian field as Georgia navigated the difficult transition to independence, amid severe economic hardship and growing security threats. She joined USAID/Georgia in 1996, working on humanitarian assistance and transitional programs. Lela recalls climbing onto mazout (fuel oil) containers to measure deliveries of U.S. Government assistance, helping ensure that fuel reached communities so they could have electricity for at least several hours daily.

Lela later received a second U.S. Government (USG) fellowship and completed a master's degree in public administration at New York University. Following her return to Georgia, she worked with international NGOs, including serving as Deputy Country Director for World Vision and Director of Grants and Compliance for a USAID-funded Community Mobilization Initiative implemented by Mercy Corps. These positions gave her valuable hands-on experience in program implementation and perspective on development from the implementing-partner side.

Lela returned to USAID in 2006. Although primarily based in Georgia, she completed temporary USAID assignments in Afghanistan, Iraq, and Burma, broadening her understanding of challenging operating environments and contributing to USG national security objectives.

Lela was also an active member of the USAID FSN Committee, the joint USAID–State Department FSN Committee, and the Global FSN Advocacy Council, where she served from 2019 to 2021. Lela contributed to improvements in Georgia's Local Compensation Plan and advocated for stronger recognition and support of Foreign Service Nationals globally. Since 2025 she has been active in UAA's FSN Working Group.

When USAID/Georgia closed, Lela faced a moment of uncertainty after more than two decades with USAID. But she never really considered leaving the field. She completed several short-term consultancies in Georgia and now works with an international NGO in Kyiv on lifesaving humanitarian programs. For her, it is a continuation of the path she started decades ago: staying close to people and helping where help is needed. During the difficult transition after USAID's closure, Lela also turned to something more personal—applied arts classes. Creativity became a way to cope, stay grounded, and move forward.

Lela is a mother of three adult children: Erekle, an artist and PhD student in Art Research in Budapest; Nutsa, a development professional who recently completed an MPP in Boston; and Liza, a master's student in Clinical Social Work in Boston.

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
